# **Important Safety Information**

When preparing for your cleanup, make sure you are dressed appropriately for the weather and the task. Wear gloves and close-toed shoes, and use a grabbing device or trash picker for hard-to-reach items.

Take the time to review and consider health and safety information prior to your cleanup. If you are unsure about any of the health and safety tips, please contact the Helen Schuler Nature Centre at 403-320-3064.

#### COVID-19

Cleanups will look a little different right now. You might be doing a solo, household, or small group cleanup, but that doesn't mean you are on your own! # General Safety Tips & Reminders

Always be safe and look out for yourself and others that are participating in your cleanup!!

- Use the buddy system: look out for each other, avoid working alone, advise where you are going and when you expect to return
- Watch the weather: stay hydrated, wear sunscreen, avoid the heat of the day
- Prevent erosion: stay off coulees in wet or muddy conditions to avoid causing damage
- Beware of: ticks, rattlesnakes, spiders, mosquitoes and wasps
- Watch bag weight: keep bags less than 10 lbs rather than overfilling, start a new bag
- **Beware of sharps:** broken glass, needles or sharp-edged items should never be placed in bags as it may inadvertently cause harm to others!
- Be visible: safety vests and road safety signs must be used while working near roadways.

## Rough Sleeper Encampments

If you find a rough sleeper (homeless) camp while participating, do not dismantle it under any circumstances! Instead, please call the Safe Community Call Centre at 403-382-0545.

# Needles & Sharps

Never reach blindly into bushes or tall grasses to pick up litter. Always ensure you can see the entire piece of litter before picking it up. In addition to other dangerous items, such as broken glass, there is the possibility of finding discarded needles. If you find a needle, please refer to the <a href="Needle Disposal Guide">Needle Disposal Guide</a>.

Never place needles in a plastic bag or garbage can as this puts other people at risk, especially staff responsible for picking up and changing garbage cans throughout the city.

For needle removal, please call the Safe Community Call Centre at 403-382-0545.

# Organizing a Solo, Household, or Small Team Cleanup Guidelines

Helen Schuler Nature Centre is resuming River Valley Conservation Projects! This year will look a little different with groups being restricted to solo, household (people who live within your household), and small team cleanups. We are excited to have you back to support conservation efforts. The safety of our volunteers is our first priority.

BEFORE you register or participate in a cleanup, please review the information below.

## About this Guide

This Guide will help you in making your cleanup safer for you and your household. Remember, you must always also refer to the public health guidance from the Alberta government regarding COVID-19 measures in effect: Click here for Alberta COVID-19 Information

It is essential you adhere to the guidance on appropriate group size and social distancing measures, in addition to the best practices for everyday action.

Keep yourself safe before, during, and after your cleanup. You have an important role in limiting the spread of COVID-19 and other illnesses, so please continue to follow the every-day action advice of the City of Lethbridge, Province of Alberta, Government of Canada, and World Health Organization:

- 1. Wash your hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds!
- 2. Avoid touching your face, eyes, nose, mouth, or ears with unwashed hands!
- 3. Practice physical distancing by keeping a minimum distance of 2 metres apart!
- 4. Avoid contact with anyone who is sick!
- 5. If you are feeling unwell, stay home!
- 6. Wear a face covering!

If you, or anyone in your household or small team, is experiencing any symptoms of COVID-19, please stay home and cancel or postpone your cleanup.

We appreciate your leadership! Thank you for being a community steward!!

# **BEFORE YOUR CLEANUP**

#### 1. Get Informed!

- Review local restrictions and guidelines: <u>COVID-19 Information</u>
- o Review provincial restrictions and guidelines: <u>COVID-19 Public Health Measures</u>

#### 2. Register!

- o Register your solo or household team cleanup: <u>Lethbridge.ca/cleanshoreline</u>
  - When planning your cleanup:
    - Avoid times when your target area may be busy
    - Choose a location close to your home
    - Use our online map to select a location: <a href="http://bit.ly/2qYhkq0">http://bit.ly/2qYhkq0</a>
- Everyone is encouraged to register so we can track areas that have been cleaned and recognize your volunteer effort! Register even if you do not require any cleaning supplies or if you have already completed a litter cleanup this year.

#### 3. Prepare for Safety!

- Ask participants from your household or small team to come with their own personal protective equipment and supplies (mask, gloves, hand sanitizer, bags) on the day of the event OR bring sanitizing supplies for them!
- Have all participants watch the Health & Safety Video at <u>Lethbridge.ca/cleanshoreline</u>

#### 4. Gather Cleanup Supplies!

- o Prepare your cleanup supplies including: gloves, bags, data card and pen
  - o Look around your home for the supplies needed for your cleanup (preferred).
  - o If you need gloves and garbage bags, a limited supply is available from the Helen Schuler Nature Centre (please call to make arrangements: 403-320-3064).
- Remember to dress appropriately for the weather and wear close-toed shoes, and review all Health & Safety Information & Guidelines!
- o Print the data card

# **DURING THE CLEANUP**

#### 1. Check your health!

- Keep our community safe if you (or someone in your household) are not feeling well, stay home! It is better to postpone or cancel your cleanup to minimize any risks!
- o Remind all participants to conduct a self-assessment before they arrive!

#### 2. Keep 2 Metres Distance from Others!

- Be sure you and your household or small team maintain physical distancing!
- Keep 2 metre distance from anyone you may encounter!

#### 3. Healthy Hands are Helping Hands!

- Wear gloves!
- Avoid touching your face, eyes, ears, nose, or mouth with unwashed hands!
- Use hand sanitizer as often as possible!
- WASH YOUR HANDS WITH SOAP & WATER!

#### 4. What to do if you find Masks, Gloves, Needles, etc?

- Safety first, always!
  - Never reach blindly into the bushes or tall grass to pick up litter!
  - o Always ensure you can see the entire piece of litter before picking it up!
  - o If you are not comfortable with picking up an item, leave it where you found it!
- In addition to other dangerous items, such as broken glass, there is the possibility of finding discarded needles.
  - If you find a needle, please refer to the <u>Needle Disposal Guide</u>
    - NEVER place dangerous items, like needles, in a plastic bag or garbage can as this puts others at risk, especially staff responsible for picking up and changing garbage cans throughout the city.

#### 5. Manage your Garbage!

- Tie your garbage bags tightly and leave them next to existing City of Lethbridge garbage bins.
- Report the total number of bags of garbage collected and where you left them in your final data report!

# An important note about cigarette butts

Cigarette butts are the most commonly littered item worldwide and Lethbridge is no exception. Unfortunately, littered cigarette butts do not disappear and can result in a fine of up to \$300.

# A little litter can do a lot of damage!

A common myth is that cigarette butts are not harmful litter because the filter is made out of cotton that will easily decompose. In truth, a typical cigarette butt filter is made out of a type of plastic called cellulose acetate. These filters can take up to ten years to decompose, leaving behind microplastic pollution.

The microplastic pollution that comes from cigarette butts isn't even the worst of what happens to that little cigarette butt that gets tossed on the ground. Furthermore, cigarette butts leach toxins into the environment, get eaten by wildlife, are a primary cause of house and forest fires, and cost millions of taxpayer dollars to clean up!

If you choose to smoke, please do your part to dispose of cigarette butts responsibly.

# Have you heard of pocket ashtrays?

Pocket ashtrays are a convenient way to butt out on-the-go – extinguishing cigarettes while sealing the smell in!

Pocket ashtrays are the perfect addition to your everyday life (you may want one for your purse, backpack, or car), but also for your adventures. The small size is ideal for your outdoor adventures like camping or kayaking – if you can carry a pack of cigarettes and a lighter, then you can also carry a pocket ashtray.
