Executive Summary:

The Lethbridge and District Exhibition: Agri-food Hub (Trade Centre) project is the design and construction of a Agri-Food Hub and Trade Centre, focused on showcasing the rich agriculture food industry here in Southern Alberta and to meet the continually growing community need.

On Aug 24, 2020, Council approved funding for the Lethbridge and District Exhibition: Agri-food Hub (Trade Centre) in the amount of \$17,824,000. At the request of Lethbridge and District Exhibition, the term of the loan is 30 years. This is to be provided as a loan to the Lethbridge and District Exhibition pursuant to this bylaw.

BYLAW 6247 OF THE CITY OF <u>LETHBRIDGE</u> (hereinafter referred to as "the Municipality") IN THE PROVINCE OF ALBERTA

WHEREAS:

The Council of the Municipality has decided to issue a bylaw pursuant to Section 264 and 265 of the *Municipal Government Act* which provides that a municipality may lend money to a non-profit organization;

AND WHEREAS:

Council has unanimously approved the expansion of the Lethbridge & District Exhibition and the construction of an Agri-Food Hub (Trade Centre), same being deemed a benefit to the City of Lethbridge;

THEREFORE Council enacts:

- 1. The City of Lethbridge will lend to the Lethbridge & District Exhibition, a non-profit organization, an amount up to \$17,824,000.00 for the renovation and construction of an Agri-Food Hub (Trade Centre).
- 2. The loan shall bear interest at the City of Lethbridge's borrowing rate at the time of borrowing and incur any additional related administration charges.
- 3. The Lethbridge & District Exhibition will repay the indebtedness in the amount of \$17,824,000.00 in such manner that the interest and principal are combined, in addition to any related administration charges and be made payable within a period of up to THIRTY years, consistent with the borrowing bylaw.
- 4. The loan authorized by this bylaw for the sum of up to \$17,824,000.00 will be borrowed from a lender by debenture and is authorized by Bylaw 6243 (the "borrowing bylaw").
- 5. The City Manager or delegate is hereby empowered and authorized to enter into contracts with the Lethbridge & District Exhibition for the purposes of loaning to the Lethbridge & District Exhibition the sum of \$17,824,000.00.
- 6. This bylaw shall take effect on the third and final reading.

Ottawa's freeze on federal Ottawas freeze on federal student loan payments and interest is weeks away from its end date, but students and graduates say extending the measure would offer relief from the lasting financial pressures of the pandaysis.

U.S. border closure extended to Oct. 21

The partial closure of Canada's border with the United States is being extended another month, to Oct. 21, both countries announced Friday. Crossings of the border have been largely restricted to trade goods, essential workers and citizens returning home since March, in an attempt to limit the spread of CCVID-19. Public Sadey Minister Bill Blair and his American counterpart, acting Homeland Security Secretary Chad Wolf, each tweeted the latest one-month extension of the closure agreement. "We will continue to base our decisions on the best public health advice available to keep Canadians safe," Blair wrote.

The Conservatives called Friday for Blair to allow more compassionate exemptions to the closure, such as for people who are engaged to be married or where loved ones are seriously ill.

We are calling on the Trudeau government to take a compassionate approach to resolve situations where families remain separated, while ensuring the health and safety of Canadians, public safety critic Shamnon Stubbs said. No one should have to guess whether they will be allowed across the border to be with family. The government must be clear about who can travel across the border, and in what circumstances."
