Reconciliation is about creating shared understanding and building strong-relationships and respect between Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples.

The City of Lethbridge invites you to engage in reconciliation in ways that you find meaningful. This may include learning about Canada's colonial history, learning basic Blackfoot words and greetings (such as Oki, the Blackfoot word for hello and Lethbridge's official greeting), providing a territory acknowledgement before meetings and events, or seeking Indigenous perspectives to inform your work.
