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Executive Summary

The objective of the Galt Gardens Master Plan was to gather background information, consult with key stakeholders as well as the public, and to prepare a master development plan for the Park. A geotechnical study, site survey and site visits were conducted in order to prepare an accurate plan of the existing conditions. Working from the baseline established by previous studies conducted by MMM and the City of Lethbridge, as well as feedback generated through consultation with key stakeholders, four preliminary concept plans were prepared. A public open house and online survey were undertaken to determine the preferred option for the development of the Park. The Preferred Concept Plan was then prepared based on input from the public open house feedback, stakeholder and project team input, as well as the Consulting Team's expertise. Through refinement and final consultation with the City of Lethbridge Project Team, a Final Development Master Plan has been prepared. This Design Report is intended to serve as documentation of these design decisions and processes, as well as to provide background information relevant to the Project's development, implementation strategies and recommendations on subsequent steps to be taken in the design development of Galt Gardens.



1. Introduction

A Brief History of Galt Gardens

In 1885, Sir Alexander Galt set aside a parcel of land as breathing space for the Town of Lethbridge. Originally known as The Square, a portion of the land was officially donated to be held in perpetuity as parkland in 1909, and was named Galt Gardens in their honour. The space has been transformed over the last 130 years, with the first bandstand erected in the 1890s and the first trees planted in 1901. The Lethbridge Fire Department took responsibility for much of the landscaping, and by the 1920s the Galt Gardens resembled much of what it is today. Throughout its early history, use of the Park included cricket, baseball, bull-train turning grounds, social events and gatherings, as well as a history-making coal miner's strike in 1906 that led to the establishment of the first Worker's Compensation Act. With the progression of expanded landscaping and pathway system, many of these activities began to be curtailed, except for concerts in the bandstand.

The Park remained largely unchanged Post-World War II and through the 1970s and `80s, but had begun losing some of its luster as the City expanded away from the downtown core, which had begun experiencing increased behavioral social issues as well as panhandling.

In the early 1990's, the Galt Gardens 2000: A Master plan for the revitalization of Galt Gardens was presented as part of the work of the Galt Gardens Revitalization Committee. Within the final design presented in the report, a performance and program area was indicated to be the main focus in the southwest corner, and was included as part of the phase one construction program. While the majority of the plan never was built, the existing Pergola and plaza area were constructed, replacing the performance and program area. No further work took place until 2003, when the Lethbridge Rotary Club approached the City with a new \$3.7 million master plan to revitalize the Park as a Rotary 2005 Centennial Project. Features that were built from that plan are the highly successful Rotary Centennial Plaza in the southeast corner, while the Pergola was expanded and renovated at the same time.

Supporting Studies

Development of the Galt Gardens Master Plan builds on previous works completed by MMM Group and the City of Lethbridge. Most noteworthy is the Heart of the City Master Plan (2007) and the Public Realm and Transportation Study (2012). A brief overview of the each of these studies and their components that apply specifically to Galt Gardens Master Plan are summarized below.

HEART OF THE CITY MASTER PLAN (HOCMP)

The HOCMP was developed to guide future public improvements and private development and to bring vibrancy, harmony and economic vitally to Downtown Lethbridge. A framework of new strategies for long-term objectives was created with the goal to transform Downtown Lethbridge to the benefit of the entire City. In addition to the framework, design guidelines and implementation strategies were developed from broad-based community participation. Some elements of the Master Plan specific to Galt Gardens include:

- Outline of key visioning strategy as follows: "To reinforce the prominence of Galt Gardens, four grand Promenades will extend as 'green fingers' from all sides of the park and link across Downtown's districts"
- Street South & 5th Street South, 2nd Avenue South & 7th Street South, and 3rd Avenue South and 6th Street South
- » Mixed-use developments adjacent to the Park as top priority in enhancing the visual and physical connectivity of Galt Gardens

More generally, the HOCMP called for a Downtown that: is active at all hours of the day and night during all seasons; is designed with craftsmanship, quality and permanence; appeals to a diversity of uses, users and cultures; celebrates and uses heritage resources; and is compatible with the historic character.

PUBLIC REALM AND TRANSPORTATION STUDY (PRATS)

The PRATS expanded on visions, ideas and concepts generated from the HOCMP. It aimed to develop public realm and streetscape concepts integrating transportation and urban design recommendations and feedback generated from public consultation. The study also aimed to determine 20-year requirements for pedestrian, cyclist, freight, vehicle movements and parking in the Downtown district. Some points relevant to Galt Gardens that arose from the study include:

- » Emphasize Galt Gardens as the main public open space within Downtown Lethbridge
- » Propose multi-modal bikeways that lead to Galt Gardens
- » Allocate space for a plaza intersection at 2nd Avenue South and 5th Street South that can be closed off for occasional larger events or a market
- » Allocate space for enhanced walkways on the northern portion of 3rd Avenue South that borders the Park
- » Allocate space for a vertical marker / gateway feature at the intersection of 2nd Avenue South and 5th Street South, to identify Galt Gardens as a key destination along 2nd Avenue South and its immediate vicinity
- » Allocate space for the relocation of Locomotive #3651 from its present location to a more prominent location at the Northwest corner of the Park
- » Allocate space for a "Downtown Shuttle" at the Northwest corner of the Park



- » Allocate space for on-street parking that is raised to the level of the sidewalk surrounding the Park
- » Allocate space for shared pedestrian and biking lanes surrounding the Park

Current Park Conditions

Currently, Galt Gardens takes the form of a traditional public square. A hierarchy of paved pathways are laid out geometrically following the major axis of the site and focusing on a central green area flanked by four large evergreens. Until recently, this central green area had held the memorial cenotaph, which has since been relocated to the City Hall area.

The site is relatively flat, except for the elevated area in the centre of the Park, and is primarily landscaped with manicured grass. A large number of mature coniferous and deciduous trees are located throughout the Park. Annual planting beds are located in a variety of locations around the Park. A few benches are located throughout the Park, and a cluster of picnic tables are located near the Rotary Centennial Plaza water feature. Minimal street lighting reaches the interior of the Park, with most park lamp standards being located on its periphery. An existing site conditions plan illustrating the conditions from which all base mapping has been produced is provided in Appendix A – Existing Site Condition.

Today the Park is a relatively underutilized amenity, with a declining permanent population in the downtown area contributing to the lack of day-to-day usage of the site by the citizens of Lethbridge. Undesirable activities related to drug and alcohol use, and with a lack of meaningful daily activities elsewhere, there is a population of people that have come to habitually use the Park. To a large portion of the public, this has created a perception of the Park being an unsafe place, despite increased security monitoring and policing the area. These undesirable activities largely take place in the southwest quadrant of the Park, around the area where the pergola is located.

However, recent additions to the Park have begun to breathe new life and create positive perceptions of the historic space. These additions include: the Rotary Centennial Plaza water feature; upgrades to the pergola structure; renovations to the Southern Alberta Arts Gallery (SAAG); development of the CASA building east of the park across 7th Avenue South; the aforementioned increased security presence; and, large events and other programming which all have begun to bring people back to the Park in a meaningful way. These improvements and activities are almost entirely located in or near the southeast quadrant of the Park, with the northern portion still remaining to be underused, resulting in the untapped potential of Galt Gardens to again be the outdoor and cultural 'heart of the city'.

To build on recent efforts to improve park usability, the City of Lethbridge engaged the consulting services of WSP/MMM. Their role was to lead the Project process, coordinate and facilitate communications with the Project Team and Stakeholders. Their ultimate task was the preparation of a Concept Master Plan to quide the evolution of the Park forward into a lively, thriving open space for all the citizens of Lethbridge.

Site Opportunities and Constraints

A preliminary site visit was conducted on August 16, 2016. The Project Team visually inspected the site and its periphery, noting opportunities and constraints for the future development of the Park along the way. These included:

OPPORTUNITIES

- » The Park is centrally located
- Potential connections to Park Place Mall, medical centres and seniors housing which could increase usage for the northern half of the park
- » Park is near high-use entities such as Park Place Mall and CASA
- » Connections to CASA and SAAG, in terms of both physical layout and events programming
- With existing abundance and aging tree numbers in the Park, there is a potential for removal of select trees to create a greater amount of barrier-free greenspace for variable and flexible programming which meets the changing needs of the Park
- » The existing mature tree canopy also provides opportunities for shade, shelter etc.
- » There are new electrical site servicing upgrades recently done in the Park
- » Galt Gardens already has a history of hosting successful events which valuable feedback can be gleaned from
- » Rotary Centennial Plaza water feature is highly successful and has begun to bring people back the Park
- » Established presence in the social consciousness of the people of Lethbridge
- » A civic commitment to ensuring the renewed place and viability of the Park in the lives of the people of Lethbridge

CONSTRAINTS

- » Damage to trees and their extensive tree root systems when reconfiguring pathways may be likely
- » Trees are generally same age with little succession planting with the potential for mass die-offs
- » Current pathway system does not respect the way people use parks today or even the current desire lines of Galt Gardens
- » Current pathway system creates small segmented pieces of green space
- » Current flower and planting bed system is fragmented
- » Coordination of design upgrades with existing utilities and infrastructure
- » Current pergola plaza configuration does not connect well to Park and is a desirable gathering point, creating potential social conflict issues
- » Current lack of public transportation linkage to site
- » Lack of close permanent population to use the Park
- » Little existing connectivity of the Park to existing urban fabric
- » Angle parking on 3 sides currently acts as a visual and physical barrier to park entry



- The current lack of lighting in the Park does not create sense of safety or allow for comfortable after-dark use
- » Public perception of safety relating to the Park for all times of the day

2. Background Report

Geotechnical Studies

A geotechnical investigation was undertaken on August 25, 2016 and involved: a site review, including utility locates; and, field drilling, test pitting, sampling and groundwater measurements. Six (6) geotechnical boreholes were drilled to depths ranging from 6.4 to 9.4m and twelve (12) soil samples were obtained for laboratory testing. Approximately 0.3 m of topsoil were encountered in all boreholes from ground surface. However, the precise layer of topsoil is expected to vary across the site. Clay fill in moist condition was encountered underlying the topsoil, extending to depths of up to 3.2m and having organic content ranging from 1.5m to 2.9m thick. Due to lack of records in the placement of fill, it is assumed that fill material is erratic and not suitable to support improvements at grade. Beneath topsoil and clay fill, a medium plastic glacial clay till was encountered in all boreholes in moist condition, extending up to the maximum depth of the boreholes. Groundwater measurements resulted in levels ranging from 4.0 to 5.6m below ground surface. It should be noted, however, that measurements were taken during a period with typically seasonal low groundwater levels and may not be representative of the site's long term average or wetter periods of the year.

Based on the geotechnical investigation, it was determined that shallow foundation systems with vertical bearing resistance of 0.5 and horizontal resistance (sliding) of 0.8 should be employed to support any structures in future development of the Park. It was also noted that fill material and softer native soils encountered would require removal or reworking for support of surface improvements. Descriptions of engineered and structural fill to alter site grade and support structures have been included in the geotechnical report.

The complete geotechnical report is included in *Appendix B*.

Stakeholder and Public Engagement

Stakeholder Engagement and Design Charrette

A stakeholder engagement session and design charrette were held on August 16, 2016 at the Southern Alberta Arts Gallery in Lethbridge. Twenty (20) participants attended, including the City Project Team and staff, representatives from the Heart of Our City Steering Committee, community Stakeholders from various organizations and associations, as well as local business owners operating near the Park. The engagement session involved a brief introduction to the Project, an overview of other park precedents and key elements to the quality design of public parks, a dotmocracy, breakout sessions for group discussion and design aspirations, as well as answering an exit survey. A complete list of participants and all engagement documentation has been provided in *Appendix C*.

DOTMOCRACY

Panels showing images of various design elements were placed around the room and participants were asked to place a dot on those images that appealed to them most. Top rated elements included:

- » Traditional park images
- » Lighting / decorative night lighting
- » Safety enhancements
- » Bandstand pavilion
- » Performance stage
- » Winter activities
- » Restaurant permanent
- » Community gardens
- » Places of refuge and alternative seating nodes »
- » Pickle ball
- » Train

- » Policing
- » Active management
- » Playground
- » Seniors activities
- » Gardens
- » Open lawn
- » Horticulture
- » Enhanced seating
- » Enhanced gateways
- » Decorative sculpture



GROUP DISCUSSIONS

During the engagement session, participants divided into smaller groups and were given some high level questions to generate discussion. From these discussions the following list of current challenges and issues emerged:

- » Poor night lighting
- » Character of north half of Park
- » Tree canopy degradation (current + future)
- » Security concerns pergola area specific
- » Access conditions into Park
- » Visibility into Park esp. southwest corner
- » Overall lack of activity space / activities
- » Ineffective pathway structure
- » Connections to downtown
- » Connections to mall

- » Edge conditions
- » SAAG integration
- » Amphitheatre seating perception, storage, operations, universal accessibility
- » Seasonal use
- » Street parking barrier
- » Isolation of north half of Park
- » Wind screens
- » Transit access
- » Pick up and drop off zone

They were also asked to play designer, and to put themselves in the shoes of the Consulting Team and provide graphic feedback in the form of high-level aspirational plans. They were provided scaled base plans and markers and drew in and illustrated key features they would like to see in the Park.

RESULTING PRELIMINARY DESIGN STRATEGIES

The day following the Stakeholder Engagement Session, the Consulting Team provided a debrief and presentation to illustrate what they felt they had heard the preceding day.

From input provided during the dotmocracy, discussions and design charrette, a go forward design strategy was presented for Stakeholder feedback and approval. In this approach, the Consulting Team presented three different design concepts with the key concepts that were to be encapsulated in each. Referred to as Traditional, New Central Focus, and New Central Green, these options would form the baseline for any options to be further refined into a single Redevelopment Master Plan. The following describes the main features to be presented in the three plan typologies:

» <u>Traditional</u>

- Large central open space
- Preservation / expansion of current walkway pattern
- Bandstand / pavilion
- Train
- Children's playground

- Tourist info building
- Washrooms at north end
- Second Ave connection
- Formal garden area with fountain
- New corner plazas / connections with surrounding neighbourhoods
- Amphitheatre filled in ¾
- Maintained current stage location
- Sculpture garden
- Café space

» New Central Focus

- Pathway system modified to soften and enhance central promenade
- Central feature, e.g. ornamental garden and fountain, or civic commemoration, or pavilion bandstand
- Children's playground
- Amphitheatre filled in for new event lawn
- Beach volleyball, pickle ball
- New corner plazas / connections with surrounding neighbourhoods
- Second Ave connection

» New Central Green

- Pure and open
- Modified path system, perimeter promenade around central open space
- Ornamental garden and fountain on north side
- Amphitheater gone, replaced by civic plaza including skating rink
- Stage relocated, double sided to face existing pergola and new open lawn
- Café space
- New corner plazas / connections with surrounding neighbourhoods
- Second Ave connection



Chalkboard Surveys

Following the Stakeholder Engagement Session, the 100K Lethbridge Initiative Team introduced a commentary chalkboard in Galt Gardens at the southeast entrance. Different questions were posted on the chalkboard to engage the public and gather feedback. Responses to the questions have been summarized below and images of the boards have been included in *Appendix C*.

Public Open House

A Public Open House was held on September 28th, 2016 at the Southern Alberta Ethnic Association in Lethbridge. In total, four preliminary concepts were presented that integrated feedback provided in the first Stakeholder engagement session and the chalkboard surveys. Presentation boards were placed around the room, allowing the public to casually browse the design process and concepts, as well as being able to ask questions to the moderators as required. In general, the concepts were well received with no major concerns voiced. The 31 people that signed in to the Open House were asked to complete an exit survey. This same presentation was also shown to the Stakeholders prior to the Open House for information and feedback.

Online Surveys

Following both the Stakeholder engagement session and the public open house, surveys were hosted on the City of Lethbridge website to gather more feedback to be utilized in the design process. A summary of the findings from each of these surveys are outlined below and full survey results have been included in *Appendix C.*

ONLINE SURVEY #1

The survey consisted of 12 questions in total with the purpose of collecting information on the demographics of people using the park, the frequency with which the Park is visited, how it is accessed and used, the current perception of the Park and design considerations for redevelopment. In total, 285 survey responses were collected. The majority of respondents fell into the 31-40 year age group and lived outside of the downtown. The majority of respondents said they frequented the Park on a monthly basis, while about a third of respondents said they frequented the park annually. The biggest reason listed to visit the Park was to attend festivals and events, while using a personal vehicle to get there. Approximately half of respondents had young children. More than three-quarters of respondents felt the Park was moderately or under used. Of a number of design considerations listed within the survey, the top 5 most voted considerations were: playground, lighting, performance space / stage, tree canopy and farmer's market. Important historical elements to be considered in redevelopment included the bandstand, the locomotive, the mature trees and its historical significance as a central gathering space.

ONLINE SURVEY #2

The second survey related to the 4 preliminary concepts that were presented in the Public Open House. The survey consisted of 5 questions to determine the preferred concept, particular elements that people

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liked or did not like in the new proposed concepts, and any elements that had not been included that they would like to see in the final plan. In total, 55 survey responses were gathered. The majority of respondents preferred Concept 2. The main element not shown in this concept that respondents wished to see in the Final Development Master Plan was a great lawn for more open space. Additional elements not shown in the preliminary concepts that respondents wished to see in the Final Development Plan included: more seating, public art and ornamental gardens. There was a strong dislike for elements with sand, such as bocce courts and beach volleyball courts. Additional considerations for the Final Development Master Plan included: recognition of the indigenous heritage of the area, an emphasis on open space and improved access to the Park.

Design Development

Following the first Stakeholder engagement session, from which a go forward strategy was presented to focus on three general themes (Traditional, New Central Focus, and New Central Green) four preliminary concepts were prepared and presented to the Stakeholders and at the Public Open House on September 28, 2016. The reduced versions of the four plans, and the over-arching theme and key elements of each have been summarized below with larger copies of each of the concepts in Appendix D.

- » Relocated train at 1st Avenue South
- » Abstract pathway system
- » Formal reflective area at northeast corner with relocated cenotaph as an axial focal point
- » Active area along west side to include beach volleyball, bocce ball and pickle ball courts, as well as a flex area for outdoor fitness
- » Emphasize connections and linkage through 2nd Avenue South
- » Completely revamped area within promenade to include a slightly depressed area created for skating complete with tensile roof structure
- » New play area at Rotary Centennial Plaza

Theme: The dynamic shape of an oval is used to create a new experiential walkway loop surrounding an architectural pavilion, providing a new central focus while also leaving a large open area of green space

Key Elements:

- » Heavily modified pathway system
- » Various focal points and plazas throughout park
- » Secondary pathway linkage system
- » Secondary covered kiosk area near active area
- » Sculpture garden
- » Relocated engine at northwest corner
- » Heavily modified plaza within the promenade to create a new tiered amphitheater towards the Northwest stage
- » Completely revamped area within promenade to include a slightly depressed area created for skating complete with tensile roof structure
- » New play area at Rotary Centennial Plaza

Theme: Similar to Concept 3 but with a central focal point to give an open, flexible, great lawn.

Concept 4 also provides a secondary stage in the form of an open air pavilion, creating an architectural focal point that may be used with the plaza or great lawn.

- » Open air pavilion
- » Heavily modified pathway system
- » Various focal points and plazas throughout park
- » Secondary pathway linkage system
- » Secondary covered kiosk area near active area
- » Sculpture garden
- » Relocated engine at northwest corner
- » Heavily modified plaza within promenade to create a new amphitheater towards northwest stage

5. The Vision

Galt Gardens 2017 and Beyond

Through the process of engagement with key Stakeholders and the Public, and by the feedback generated in that process, the Consulting Team recommended that the vision for the Park be defined by it being a safe, thriving destination in downtown Lethbridge; a place to see and be seen; and be filled with colour and excitement during all seasons. It should be a park that provides a variety of attractions and flexible uses for all ages and cultures, reflecting the current identity of the City of Lethbridge while paying homage to its past through historic references and harmonious architecture. The Park must be acknowledged as a living entity that exemplifies strong management, and adapts to changing needs and social makeup of the Community. Finally, it should be a social, economic, environmental and financially sustainable thread within the urban fabric, and one that will generate investment around and act a catalyst for ongoing development around it to keep the beat in the heart of the city.

Design Intent and Overarching Principles

Through the Stakeholder and Public Engagement process and by committing to the vision for the Park, a series of overarching design principles were developed. While they were generated through the engagement and feedback process, this is where the Consulting Team also applied their knowledge and understanding of what contributes to a successful urban park. These statements and principles were meant to act as a guide and inform the design process as well as to contribute to the understanding of the intentions behind the final Master Plan Development.

- The Park should generally contain flexible spaces and not be overly programmed. This will allow for a multitude of uses/users.
- There should be a consistency in the expression of the design and with any built forms throughout the Park as well as defined areas identified. This will help create a new identity for the Park as well as for the particular areas and architecture that is identified within it.
- There should not be a singular overall concept to be applied to the park in an abstract way, as they can be restrictive and easily dated, but an attempt to create a park that can carry concepts and themes in areas that can be expanded or changed over time.
- » The Park should be designed for all types of users including active and passive as well as young and old.
- The final Master Plan should be respectful of higher value themes and elements that were identified in the engagement sessions and attempt to carry them forward in a meaningful manner. Examples of this were the ideas of incorporating gardens into the design. This concept refers back to the original naming of Galt Gardens, indigenous heritage, and the history of Lethbridge.



- The Park and the new Master Plan should be highly connective to the urban fabric of the downtown core and acknowledge the potential for future initiatives (SAAG). The connectivity should involve activating the edge conditions and creating better linkage and points of pedestrian access.
- » The Park should consider present and future connections for public transportation.

6. Final Master Development Plan

Preferred Concept Plan Outline

Following the public open house, a go-forward strategy for developing a single preferred concept was established. Based on feedback from the Stakeholder and public engagement sessions, discussions with the Project Team, as well as the Project Team's expertise in the design of the public realm and public parks, and informed by survey results and internal discussions, Concept 2 was selected as the guiding framework for the preferred concept plan. This concept honours a formal path hierarchy, while presenting it in a more dynamic fashion to reflect modern day use of the park. The revised plan also integrates some elements from the three other concepts presented at the public open house. Most notable of these is the open central lawn and offset pavilion fundamental to Concept 4. A summary of the key elements in the final concept plan are as follows:

- » A centrally located great lawn.
- » A re-imagined pergola plaza, and a tensile roof structure for shelter from the elements.
- » An open air, two-sided pavilion and stage that completes the geometry of the pergola structure and connects to the great lawn.
- » Enhanced connections at 2nd Avenue South and the northwest and northeast corners of the Park.
- » New plazas and designed areas connected to the northwest and northeast corners.
- » A new plaza dedicated to acknowledging indigenous heritage.
- » New architectural kiosks to provide opportunities for washrooms, storage, information or other programming.
- » A sculptural garden connecting SAAG to the Park.
- » Supportive new tree plantings including perimeter allée walks.

Preferred Concept Plan Description

The following is a more detailed description of the thought process and design intent of the elements described earlier:

The great lawn is meant to provide a large open and flexible gathering space that can be used informally by visitors to the Park, or as an area large enough to host a crowd as part of large programmed events.
The tree-lined circular pathway surrounding the lawn creates an opportunity for people to utilize the Park

for walks and runs or simply to find a bench under a shade tree and people watch. It has the opportunity to become the cultural gathering space for the Park, used in conjunction with the proposed pavilion, plazas and Rotary Centennial Plaza.

- The pergola plaza is to be redeveloped, with the existing lawn and sunken seating area facing the existing stage to be removed and replaced by a new at-grade paved plaza. Decorative paving which may be geometric or themed in nature, and that may help tell a story relevant to the Park or Lethbridge. This hard surface will provide the flexibility and ability to host a multitude of events including farmers markets, exhibits and music events or plays. A tensile roof structure is proposed for the plaza, and would be strategically placed within it as to allow for clear sightlines to both stage areas in the pergola and proposed pavilion, while providing protection from the elements. The form of the roof is meant to be symbolic and of the wind and local conditions of the area.
- Connecting into the circular pathway surrounding the great lawn and the pergola plaza, is the new proposed open air pavilion. Sitting at the crux of the two circles formed by the pergola plaza and the path surrounding the great lawn. It is respectful of their geometric forms by integrating into the connective area of the two overlapping circles. Not only does it provide a connection point between these two areas and provide flexibility in event programming, but it will be the main focus for larger events to be held in the Park. Its architectural form is meant to be respectful to other structures through the materials that it employs, but thoughts are that it may have a more organic roof form, working with the geometry of the circles described earlier. Large built-out faux bases surrounding the actual supporting columns may double as storage and/or change areas, as well as provide the ability to provide mechanical and electrical servicing for productions that utilize the facility (see sketch drawings in inspirational images).
- As identified in the PRATS and HOTC studies, the 2nd Avenue South connections at the Park along 5th Street South and 7th Street South are high value points to connect into the Park. The final design respects this directive and proposes enhanced plaza connections from the downtown urban fabric into the Park. As with the other connection points from the City into the Park, these gateways will be indicated by large themed entry markers, lighting and enhanced paving to differentiate the Park interface from the sidewalk and signal their importance. These plazas then connect into the heart of the Park via wide promenades that are further accentuated with bands of planting and bench seating. They are meant to be grand entrances into the Park and as such are the widest pathway entries into the site. Their width also allows for flexibility in programming within them, such as allowing vendors or other types of activities to be situated on them while not interfering with pedestrian traffic.
- With the relocated Locomotive #3651 and themed sculptural activity areas framed by proposed kiosks that can be used for either washrooms or other users including information facilities, the northwest corner is anticipated to become the active hub of the north half of the Galt Gardens. It is hoped that the relocated engine will be accessible to Park users to touch, climb over and experience. The sculpture that ties into the engine is meant to be thematic and playful nature, and should be able to be engaged and used by people of all ages, including children. Seating areas flank both sides of the play area directly behind the kiosks and connect with the adjoining pathways. Within this quadrant of the Park, space has also been allocated for play areas and potential future programmed activities (e.g. bocce or volleyball). With the already bustling

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Rotary Centennial Plaza in the southeast quadrant of the park, it is anticipated that there will be a magnetism for users between these two areas, creating lively interplay across the entire Park.

- The northeast corner is intended to be more reflective and tranquil in nature with its shaded areas, enhanced gardens, intimate seating areas and water feature. This space was designed to provide the opportunity to honour the legacy of key city-building groups and individuals through a future system of markers or monuments. It is an area that could also be the designated "garden" area (as identified as a key feature in the Stakeholder and Public engagement) with the potential to showcase local horticultural efforts in large mass planting beds. With this strategy there are also educational opportunities in using interpretive panels or markers to illustrate how the plants have fit into the area's history. A water feature sits prominently on the main axis leading into the area and will help create white noise to mask the urban condition outside of the park. The small seating areas, meant to provide opportunities for quieter social interplay could also be themed and/or tell stories or reference historically significant events, people or places. This can be done through treatments in the paving or surfacing, or with some other form of interpretive marker system.
- » A node and plaza at the south end of the north promenade is intended to acknowledge the indigenous cultures in the area. It is currently designed with a central focus and paving patterns that may reference the symbols and history of the indigenous cultures' of the area. Educational tools such as using planting or other symbolic references in the plaza area that may be of significance to these indigenous cultures, can also be employed. It is anticipated that when the Project goes into detailed design that a consultation process with appropriate first nations will take place prior to the final form of the plaza being decided upon.
- » Common elements through the Park will include pedestrian and bollard lighting as well as new furniture that includes benches and/or garbage and recycling stations. The light fixtures and furniture chosen should be respectful to the historic aspect of the Park, yet provide the flexibility for programming that may include housing Wi-Fi and/or electrical connections for a variety of uses. Lighting levels and locations have been proposed for this plan with supplier information accompanying this report, including diagrams illustrating the proposed lighting intensity and illumination of the Park. These are included in *Appendix F*.
- New gateway markers are proposed for the new plazas leading into the Park, as well as for the existing connections at the southwest and southeast corners. These are intended to be visual markers to announce, identify and brand the Park and the specific area it is located at. For example the gateway marker at the northwest corner could identify Park and also indicate Locomotive Plaza. This type of place making and meeting place identification is an effective way of having the general population emotionally engage and identify with all aspects of the Park. These architectural pieces are also an opportunity to create dynamic components for the Park, which through lighting, movement and/or their sculptural appearance may be visually engaging at all hours of the day. As mentioned these markers are also an opportunity to provide theming for the particular entry points into the park, effectively becoming a means of way finding. Other types of signage that should be considered are banners programs, and informational signage for areas that may contain a particular theme, or represent a cultural historic or geographic reference.

- » Allée walks have also been indicated along the east and northwest sides of the Park. These have been created by adding rows of supporting tree planting and will provide a shaded experience for people to walk and sit.
- » SAAG exists on the south boundary of Galt Gardens but is secluded from it. A Sculpture Garden physically tying into the facility and connecting to 3rd Avenue South and the Great Lawn walk will connect the Park and SAAG in a meaningful way while also providing other opportunities for public engagement and additionally creating a street presence and connection for the Park.







Cost Estimate

The Preliminary Concept was approved in October, 2016. The opinion of probable cost at the Final Concept Phase yielded values of approximately \$1.4 million in construction costs for phase 1 of development, \$1.6 million in construction costs for Phase 2 of development and \$575,000 for Phase 3 of development. The total opinion of probably cost for all three phases of development has been estimated at \$4.4 million including contingencies.

A revised breakdown for the opinion of probable cost for Final Master Plan Development has been included in *Appendix G*. With the refinement of the design it is estimated at \$5.0 million dollars including contingency.

Implementation Strategies

We have divided the redevelopment of the Park into 3 phases, for the re-design of Galt Gardens, we have outlined the following implementation strategies:

PHASE 1

Accounting for roughly 40% of the total cost of development, Phase 1 will include all major site removals and preparation, primary pathways, a playground, select lighting and site furnishings associated with major pathways, and select trees planting. Those areas to be covered in phases 2 and 3 will be temporarily sodded.

Elements to be included:

- » Utility relocation and light removals
- » Curbing
- » Tree removal
- » Pathway removal
- » Irrigation modifications
- » Grading
- » New primary pathways
- » Select site furniture
- » Select tree planting
- » Sculptural playground



PHASE 2

Accounting for roughly 45% of the total cost of development, Phase 2 will include the addition of secondary pathway systems and the site furniture and plantings associated with them. Phase 2 will also include the relocation of the Locomotive 3651 back to Galt Gardens, as well as the addition of several of the design's built structures.

Elements to be included:

- » Train relocation + sculptural play pieces
- » New secondary pathways
- » Select site furniture
- » Select tree plantings
- » Intensive landscaped areas
- » Water feature
- » Open air pavilion
- » New signage and entry markers
- » Washrooms, Informative and Café kiosks

PHASE 3

Accounting for roughly 15% of the total cost of development, Phase 3 will finalize the Park's redevelopment with the addition of the remaining built structures, as well as art programs.

Elements to be included:

- » Pergola plaza redevelopment
- » Washrooms, Informative and Café kiosks
- » Wayfinding / Interpretative signage
- » Art programs

Other Design Recommendations and Subsequent Steps in Design Development


Issues that were outside of our scope of study should be noted and will either precede or accompany the development of the Park over the next number of years.

- At the City's earliest convenience, we recommend that shrub planting in the southwest corner be removed to allow for clearer sightlines and light penetration into the area. Currently the area is extremely dark and does not conform to CPTED (Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design) standards. A low, hardy groundcover to replace the shrub plantings is recommended. This shrub removal could take place prior to undertaking detail design of redevelopment outlined in this report.
- » An electric needs analysis should be performed prior to development to coordinate the new design and location of electric facilities.
- » Specific consultation should be included as part of the detailed design phase, to guide development of symbolic indigenous heritage components in the Park.
- » In conjunction with subsequent design phases, we recommend identifying specific art competitions for integration in the Final Park Design.
- » Engage an architectural consultant to undertake the detailed design of the Open Air Pavilion and Kiosk(s).
- » Coordinate with the SAAG on proposed connections to the Park based on future expansion of their building.

7. SUMMARY

The Master Plan is a large step in moving forward with future development of Galt Gardens, building on momentum that has been developed with the recent addition of the Rotary Centennial Plaza and the upgrades to the pergola structure. It charts a new direction for the Park while allowing for the flexibility of use that will see Lethbridge through its growth into the next millennium. By taking a phased approach to redevelopment, short term improvements can be tested and refined in subsequent design development. Given the enthusiasm and interest received during engagement sessions, there is no doubt this public open space will reach its full potential and reclaim its rightful title as the Heart of the City.

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1 INTRODUCTION

WSP Canada Inc. (WSP) was retained by The City of Lethbridge to complete a geotechnical assessment for the proposed redevelopment of the Galt Gardens Park in Lethbridge, Alberta.

The scope of work for the geotechnical assessment included the following items:

- → Site review, including utility locates;
- → Field drilling, test pitting, sampling, testing and groundwater measurements;
- → Laboratory testing on selected soil samples as required; and
- Preparation of a geotechnical assessment report with design parameters and geotechnical recommendations and comments.

This report presents the results of the geotechnical assessment and provides comments pertinent to the geotechnical aspects of the proposed development. The use of this report is subject to the Terms of Reference outlined in Appendix A, which form an integral part of this report.

2 SITE AND PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The project site is located within Galt Gardens Park in downtown Lethbridge, Alberta. The southern portion of the gardens are currently occupied by recreational amenities such as spray parks and washroom/changing facilities. Outside of the developed areas, the park is relatively flat and landscaped and also includes paved trails and numerous public art pieces. The site is bound on all side by roads, with a mall to the north and commercial buildings to the east, west and south.

We understand that general geotechnical recommendations are required for future development of the gardens, which may include the addition of art exhibits and a concession stand.

3 INVESTIGATION METHODOLOGY

3.1 GEOTECHNICAL FIELD INVESTIGATION

On August 25, 2016, WSP technical staff coordinated and oversaw the drilling of six geotechnical boreholes using a truck-mounted auger drill rig. The approximate borehole locations are shown on the site plan attached in Appendix B, Figure 1. The subsurface conditions were logged as drilling proceeded and select soil samples were obtained for geotechnical laboratory soil classification testing.

The boreholes were advanced to depths ranging from 6.4 to 9.4m below ground surface (mbgs). Standard Penetration Tests (SPTs) were performed at selected depth intervals and soil samples were obtained from the split-spoon sampler. The soil stratigraphy, sampling sequences, and field and laboratory test results for the boreholes are shown on the Borehole Records attached in Appendix B.

Upon completion of drilling, a 25 mm diameter stand pipe piezometer was installed in three of the boreholes to allow for subsequent groundwater level monitoring. Stand pipe installation details are shown on the Borehole Records attached in Appendix B. The accumulated groundwater level in the piezometers were measured upon drilling completion, and again on September 22, 2016. The results of groundwater level measurements are shown on the Borehole Records and are summarized in Section 4.2 of this report.

3.2 LABORATORY TESTING

All soil samples were transported to WSP's soils and materials laboratory in Calgary for further identification, classification and selection of samples for index testing. The index test program included:

- → Moisture content testing (12 tests);
- → Particle size analyses (2 tests); and,
- Atterberg limits (3 tests).

The laboratory test results are discussed within this report, are provided on the Borehole Records in Appendix B, or are attached in Appendix C.

4 SUBSURFACE CONDITIONS

4.1 SUBSURFACE GROUND CONDITIONS

The subsurface stratigraphy encountered at the discrete borehole locations are shown on the records attached in Appendix B. The borehole records present our interpretation of the materials encountered. It is noted that the subsurface stratigraphy may be variable across the site. A description of the subsurface soil profile encountered is provided in the following sections.

4.1.1 TOPSOIL

An approximate 0.3 m thick topsoil layer was encountered in all boreholes from ground surface. The depth of topsoil is expected to vary across the site.

4.1.2 CLAY FILL

A layer of clay fill was encountered underlying topsoil in boreholes BH16-02 and BH16-05 and extended to depths of 3.2 mbgs and 1.8 mbgs. It was described as a brown, low to medium plastic clay with red shale and coal inclusions, and organic content, and was recorded to range from 1.5 m to 2.9 m in thickness. The depth and lateral extent of fill is expected to vary across the site. We have not been provided with any records of information indicating that the fill had been placed in a controlled

manner with suitable compactive effort. For this reason we must assume that the fill material is erratic in its properties and is not suitable to support improvements at grade.

A moisture content test performed on a samples of clay fill resulted in a moisture content of 15.1%, indicating moist condition

4.1.3 MEDIUM PLASTIC CLAY TILL

Medium plastic glacial clay till was encountered in all boreholes underlying the topsoil and/or fill. The clay till was described as brown with trace to some sand. The medium plastic clay till extended to the maximum depth of the boreholes at 6.4 mbgs to 9.4 mbgs.

Twenty-five SPT results from tests completed within the medium plastic clay stratum provided N values of 5 to 20, indicating a firm to very stiff consistency.

Moisture content tests performed on 11 samples of medium plastic clay till resulted in moisture contents ranging from 10.1% to 25.8%, indicating moist condition. Two particle size analyses and three Atterberg limits tests were performed on clay samples which confirmed medium plasticity. The laboratory test results are presented in Table 1.

4.2 GROUNDWATER CONDITIONS

Standpipe piezometers were installed in the three of the geotechnical boreholes to allow for subsequent groundwater level measurements. Groundwater level measurements were recorded upon drilling completion and again on September 22, 2016. The results are presented in Table 2.

It should be recognized that groundwater level measurements were conducted during a period with typically seasonal low groundwater levels and may not be representative of the sites long term average or conditions during the wetter months of the year.

5 GEOTECHNICAL COMMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

This section of the report provides engineering information pertinent to geotechnical aspects of the project based on the data obtained through WSP's geotechnical assessment, review of available information, and on our understanding of the project requirements.

5.1 GEOTECHNICAL SITE CONSIDERATIONS

The following geotechnical considerations are provided for the future development design and construction. The following summarises the geotechnical setting of the site:

- → Shallow foundation systems are considered suitable to support structures for the future development of the site;
- → Fill material and softer native soils were encountered during the investigation, and these materials are not considered suitable for the support of future structures and would require removal or reworking for support of surface improvements.

The following sections provide geotechnical design parameters in Limit States Design format as per National Building Code of Canada¹ (NBCC), Canadian Foundation Engineering Manual² (CFEM) and the Alberta Building Code³ (ABC). The following resistance factors (Φ) are applied to determine factored design values:

Shallow Foundations:

- \rightarrow Vertical bearing resistance: $\Phi = 0.5$; and,
- \rightarrow Horizontal resistance (sliding): $\Phi = 0.8$.

5.2 GEOTECHNICAL MATERIAL PARAMETERS

Based on the results of the field investigation and WSP's experience with similar soils, estimated (unfactored) soil parameters for the medium plastic clay till encountered at the project site are provided in Table 3.

¹ The value of undrained shear strength has been estimated based on visual observation of the soil conditions and results of the SPTs. It should be noted that undrained shear strength is not an intrinsic soil parameter, and its value varies with factors such as depth, stress conditions, water content, etc.

5.3 FROST PENETRATION DEPTH

The near-surface soil units encountered at the site generally consisted of a layer of topsoil underlain by clay fill and medium plastic clay. The qualitative frost susceptibility of a soil is typically assessed using guidelines developed by Casagrande (1932)⁴ on the basis of the percentage by weight of the soil finer than 0.02 mm and its plasticity index. This classification system has been adapted by the US Army Corps of Engineers and the CFEM. Soils are classed as F1 through F4 in order of increasing frost susceptibility. The near surface soil encountered at the project site is to be classified as medium frost susceptible soil, Frost Groups F3.

The maximum seasonal frost penetration depth was calculated for the near-surface deposits using the procedure described in CFEM. A mean freezing index of 1,125°C-days was used for the site. The average seasonal frost penetration depth is estimated to be approximately 2.1 mbgs.

Foundation elements should have a minimum frost protection equivalent to a soil cover of at least 2.1 m and 1.8 m for unheated and heated structures, respectively. Rigid insulation may be used to provide frost protection equivalent to the required soil cover. Insulation used for frost protection should be placed at a minimum depth of 0.6 m below the finished ground surface and the top 0.6 m of backfill (i.e. above the insulation) should be ignored for equivalent frost penetration calculation purposes. The surface of the insulation should be sloped such that groundwater contacting the impervious sheets is directed away from structures.

The construction of shallow site improvements such as concrete flatwork should consider the influence of potential frost heave during the design phase. Surface improvements sensitive to movement may require the use of insulation or adequate control joints to address potential differential heave due to frost.

6 SITE DEVELOPMENT COMMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

At the time of preparation of this report no specific final development details were available, the following can be used as preliminary information and for general guidance. Once the project details have been finalised, WSP should be given an opportunity to review to confirm the following recommendations validity.

6.1 SITE PREPARATION, GRADING AND DRAINAGE

Site preparation, prior to placement of any subgrade fill or shallow surface improvements such as concrete flatwork, should include stripping and removal of any and all vegetation, topsoil, organics and other deleterious material that may be present such as un-compacted, uncontrolled man-made fill.

The stripped subgrade should be reviewed by WSP prior to fill placement to identify areas containing near-surface deleterious materials. Full time monitoring of fill during placement to confirm compaction is also recommended for all fill to be placed beneath structural areas (buildings or parking areas, roads and driveways). Recommended backfill soils to bring the site to its final grade along with placement and compaction criteria are provided in Section 6.2.

It is recommended that final site grading be provided to direct water to areas remote from any proposed structures. Minimum landscape gradients of 1% are recommended to reduce the risk of surface water run-off ponding in localised areas. Parking lots or landscaping within a zone of approximately 2 m of the exterior perimeter of any structure should be graded to drain away from the structures at a minimum gradient of 2%. Furthermore, downspouts should be positively directed away from any buildings.

6.2 FILL SELECTION, PLACEMENT AND COMPACTION RECOMMENDATIONS

6.2.1 ENGINEERED FILL

Engineered fill material to alter site grade and for general fill should consist of the native medium plastic clay present on site or similar imported soils. Recommended placement and compaction specifications for engineered fill are as follows:

- → Lift thickness should not exceed 300 mm (loose measure);
- → Engineered fill should be placed at a moisture content of 0% to 2% of optimum moisture content (OMC) for compaction purposes;
- → Compaction should be carried out with vibrating sheeps foot roller or similar; and
- → Compaction should achieve a minimum 98% Standard Proctor Maximum Dry Density (SPMDD).

6.2.2 STRUCTURAL FILL

Structural fill material for support of concrete slabs and flatwork should consist of imported inorganic, well-graded granular soils. The fill gradation should be approved by WSP. Recommended placement and compaction specifications for structural fill are as follows:

- → Lift thickness should not exceed 300 mm (loose measure);
- → Structural fill should be placed at a moisture content ranging of ±3% of OMC;
- → Compaction should be carried out with vibrating smooth drum roller or similar, and
- → Compaction should achieve a minimum 100% SPMDD.

6.3 FOUNDATIONS

The native medium plastic clay encountered underlying the site is considered suitable for shallow foundation support for lightly loaded structures. The following sections present design recommendations for shallow foundation systems. Recommendations for deep foundations, if required, can be provided on request.

6.3.1 SHALLOW FOUNDATIONS

6.3.1.1 SPREAD AND STRIP FOOTINGS

Shallow foundations should be founded on a uniform bearing surface comprising the native stiff medium plastic clay till.

The geotechnical bearing resistance at Ultimate Limit State (ULS) and bearing pressure at Serviceability Limit State (SLS) will depend on the footing dimensions such as footing width, length to width ratio, and embedment depth. The following design parameters are provided to simplify the design process. We recommend to review preliminary footing design for compliance with the geotechnical provisions, and to optimize foundation design parameters based on actual footing dimensions and load conditions.

The ultimate geotechnical bearing resistance at ULS for spread footings with minimum embedment depth of 0.5 mbgs and footing widths ranging from 0.5 to 2.0 m, and for strip footings with minimum embedment depth of 0.5 mbgs and footing widths ranging from 0.5 to 1.5 m, may be taken as 300 and 200 kPa, respectively. A resistance factor of 0.5 as per NBCC should be applied to determine the factored bearing resistance at ULS.

Total settlements in the order of 20 to 40 mm are expected, however a minimum of 50% of that settlement should occur during construction, with only 20 to 25 mm of settlement occurring post-construction. Differential settlement of uniformly loaded footings is expected to be less than 20 mm.

Exterior footings for heated and unheated structures should be designed with minimum embedment depth of 1.8 and 2.1 mbgs, respectively, measured from the surrounding exterior grade. Interior footings of heated structures should be designed with minimum embedment depth of 0.5 mbgs below grade, measured from the surrounding grade.

The recommended geotechnical design parameters have been determined for vertical, concentric loading, as described in CFEM. For footings subjected to eccentric loads, the following equivalent

footing width shall be used to calculate the design values (i.e. bearing resistance and bearing pressure) of the footing:

$$B' = B - 2e$$

$$L' = L - 2e$$

Where B' is the equivalent footing width; B is the actual footing width; L' is the equivalent footing width, L is the actual footing width, and e is the eccentricity of the load. Effects of inclined loads, if any, shall also be considered as discussed in CFEM.

The lateral capacity of shallow foundations may be calculated considering the sliding resistance along the base of the foundation. The ultimate sliding resistance at the foundation base may be calculated multiplying the total vertical load acting on the foundation by the coefficient of friction. A coefficient of friction of 0.3 is recommended between a cast-in-place concrete foundation base and the native medium plastic clay bearing surface, respectively. A geotechnical resistance factor of 0.8 should be considered to determine the factored lateral capacity of the foundation. It is noted that the passive earth pressure may also be considered when determining the lateral capacity of shallow foundations. However, the passive earth pressure is typically ignored within the zone subject to frost action. WSP can provide further recommendations during detailed design, if required.

Bearing surfaces shall be protected from ingress of free water, typically resulting in softening of the soil. Footings must not be placed on fill, organic, disturbed, or frozen soil. Bearing material that becomes frozen, dried or softened must be removed and replaced with concrete, or the footings shall be extended to reach material in an unaffected condition. It is also essential the foundation soil not be allowed to freeze after the concrete for footings have been placed.

6.4 TEMPORARY EXCAVATIONS

Based on our assumption of the design of future structures, it is anticipated that temporary excavations maybe required up to 2.1 mbgs in depth to construct foundations. The following should be considered when completing temporary excavations of the site:

- Conventional hydraulic excavators are considered to be suitable to excavate the subsurface soils encountered at the site.
- → All excavations should be carried out in accordance with Alberta Occupational Health and Safety (OH&S) Code⁵.
 - Based on OH&S Code Explanation Guide Part 32, Section 442⁶, the native gravels are to be classified as "likely to crack or crumble". Therefore, unsupported temporary excavations must be sloped to within 1.5 m of the base of the excavation at an angle of not less than 45° measured from the vertical; and,

- All temporary excavations should be reviewed by WSP geotechnical engineering staff at time
 of construction to confirm stability of excavation side slopes. If excessive sloughing or other
 signs of instability are observed, shallower temporary excavation side slopes may be required.
- → If the depth of temporary excavations exceeds 3.0 mbgs, additional geotechnical review should be completed to determine safe excavation side slope angles or to develop sharing recommendations; and.
- → Shallow groundwater may be encountered in excavations at the project site. Temporary dewatering may be required depending on actual required excavation depth and location of excavations within the project site.

6.5 COMMENTS ON UTILITY INSTALLATION

The on-site soils encountered during geotechnical drilling are considered suitable for trench backfill above the pipe embedment zone. At the time of construction, the excavated soils should be reviewed by WSP to confirm suitability for trench backfill purposes. Any deleterious material must be removed from the backfill soil prior to placement.

On-site soil used as trench backfill should be placed in lifts not exceeding 150 mm loose thickness, depending on the compaction equipment used. Placement and compaction of backfill soil should be monitored and tested by WSP to confirm compliance with the project specifications, this is especially important below pavement areas.

6.6 TEMPORARY CONTROL OF GROUNDWATER AND CONSTRUCTION DEWATERING

Based on the groundwater level readings completed as part of our geotechnical investigation, the ground water levels was recorded at depths of 4.0 mbgs and greater, based on the last stabilized reading.

At the time of preparation of this report, no details of foundation elevations or of proposed cut/fills were available for the site. Depending on the final elevations of the foundations and cut/fill levels, dewatering may be required during foundation excavation. As discussed in Section 4.2, groundwater levels vary from season to season and with many other factors. Dewatering is the responsibility of the contractor to determine means and methods.

Surface water should be directed away from all excavations. During construction, excavations must be protected from rain, snow or any ingress of free water. Prolonged exposure of excavated areas should be avoided to prevent freezing and deterioration of exposed soil surfaces with resultant slope instability and/or poor quality bearing surfaces. Similarly, excavated materials should be stockpiled away from the excavations to avoid slope instability and to prevent materials from falling back into the excavations. Temporary surcharge loads, such as stocks of material or heavy equipment, should be kept back from excavation faces a distance equal at least one-half the excavation depth.

6.7 PERMANENT WATERPROOFING AND DEWATERING REQUIREMENTS

It is WSPs understanding that the proposed future developments at the site will likely be constructed with no below grade structures. Damp-proofing should be provided for all structural elements in contact with the soil. Site grading recommendations are provided in Section 6.1.

At the time of preparation of this report no structure foundation elevations or cut/fill details were available. A perimeter drainage system around the foundation may be required depending on

foundation elevations and cut/fill depths. If a perimeter drainage system is required the following can be used as preliminary guidance. The perimeter drainage system should consist of a perforated drainage pipe embedded in 40 mm diameter rounded drainage gravel with a minimum thickness of 300 mm. The drainage gravel should be wrapped in a non-woven geotextile. The perimeter drainage system should be directed away to a sump and pump, to a storm sewer or to another type of permanent groundwater disposal system such as suitable daylight discharge. Once structure foundation elevations and cut/fill details have been finalized, WSP should be given an opportunity to review these details to confirm the need for perimeter drains at the site.

Freely draining gravel, if used for backfilling purposes, should be capped with minimum 0.3 m of cohesive soil to mitigate ingress of surface water into the backfill zone.

6.8 SLAB-ON-GRADE CONSTRUCTION

Slabs-on-grade are considered feasible for any future buildings on site. The slab-on-grade should be placed on a levelling course comprising of minimum 200 mm thick compacted, well-graded, 25 mm minus crushed gravel. The crushed gravel levelling course should be compacted uniformly to 100% of the SPMDD. The moisture content of the crushed gravel at placement should be within $\pm 3\%$ of its OMC.

Slabs-on-grade should float independently of all load-bearing walls and columns to minimize the potential for damage from small differential settlement between these elements. The gravel leveling course should act as a capillary break between soil and concrete, and also provide more uniform settlement.

Prior to any gravel placement, the subgrade soils should be reviewed by WSP. Any local soft or loose spots or otherwise unsuitable material, if present, should be sub-excavated and replaced with well compacted approved granular material.

Q3 What is your connection to the Park?







Visiting arborists have commented how fortunate we are to have this large park with numerous mature trees in our downtown core. A number of the trees in the park have been there for many years and do not get the attention and respect they should be afforded. Park events are held on a regular basis throughout the year in all weather conditions. This is what parks are for, however create spaces for people and activities to congregate and enjoy themselves. Currently the greenspace is continually marred due to irrigaton shutoffs (every weekend in summer months), excessive soil compaction and root damage, ruts, de-icing salts that harm vegetation, and construction/renovation projects. Protection and space to allow trees to grow should be a priority in any redevelopment of Galt Gardens. Tree health is currently being compromised due to heavy usage by multiple user groups, resulting in continual dieback in the tree canopy. This leads to increased frequency of pruning events to protect the public, creating additional stress, which further compromises tree health and longevity.
